ARRESTS MADE IN NOVEMBER 2013

There were a total of **63** arrests made within the City of North College Hill in NOVEMBER 2013.

28 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

35 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of NOVEMBER 2013, **34** were residents of North College Hill and **29** were non-residents.


VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN NOVEMBER 2013

There were a total of 28 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in NOVEMBER 2013.

0 of these crashes involved injuries.

24 of the auto accidents were on the public roadways.

4 of the auto accidents were on private property.



TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

IN NOVEMBER 2013

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$150,036.04 as of NOVEMBER 2013.



There were a total of **107** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in NOVEMBER 2013.

48 of the citations were for moving offenses (Speeding, Fail to stop at a Stop Sign, etc.)

16 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

11 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

32 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN NOVEMBER 2013

There were a total of 16 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in NOVEMBER 2013.



FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN NOVEMBER 2013

There were a total of 42 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in NOVEMBER 2013.



14 of these false alarms were to businesses.

28 of these false alarms were to residences.

340 Total false alarms have been received in 2013.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

Theft (2913.02)

PO Henn was dispatched to Family Dollar for a theft in progress. While enroute, PO Henn was given the update that the store employee was fighting with the suspect and she was last seen running north from the parking lot. Upon arrival, he was met by the reportee, who advised he had stopped two females for theft. Upon searching the listed offender's purse, he located 4 bottles of Suave Body Wash, value \$16.00, 4 bottles of Suave Deodorant, value \$14.00, and 3 Bic Lighters, value \$4.50. The offender then began struggling with the reportee, at which time the offender's purse fell to the ground and its



contents spilled onto the parking lot. The offender then ran from the scene, last seen running toward Galbraith Rd on Goodman. A search of the area failed to locate the offender; however her Ohio Operator's License was located inside the purse along with other miscellaneous personal papers belonging to that subject. The reportee positively identified the photo on the license as that of the offender. PO Henn responded to the address on the license and received no answer at the door.

The reportee was advised a report would be on file with our department to document the incident. He was also advised criminal charges will be

filed against the offender and a warrant will be issued.

Burglary (2911.12)

Officers were dispatched for a burglary that had possibly just occurred. Upon arrival, they were met by the victim and her family. The victim states her family left approximately 0920 today's date. Upon returning home, she noticed her vehicle was missing from the closed garage. Upon entering the residence, the victim found several items of jewelry had been taken from the upstairs bedroom. It appears the subject(s) gained access to the residence by pushing in a small basement window on the south side of the residence. Taken was the following items: (1) White Gold ring in the shape of a four cornered diamond with an emerald in the center, value \$1288.00, (1) White Gold pendant chain w/ small diamonds in a circle, value \$495.00, (1) Yellow Gold anniversary ring w/ diamonds, value \$1240.00, (1) Yellow Gold men's wedding band, value \$305.00, (1) Gold and diamond lady's watch, unknown value, (1) Roger Bacon High School Class of 1970 ring w/ red stone and Spartan Head. Also taken was the victim's 2007 Mazda 3, tan in color, along with

the vehicle's keys including the vehicle's electronic key fob and valet key. An All County Broadcast was issued for the vehicle through the Hamilton County Communication Center and the vehicle has been entered as stolen.

The scene was processed by Specialist Fritz, and partial latent prints were recovered. Three jewelry boxes were recovered for possible processing as well. The victim was advised a report would be on file with our department to document the incident and to contact her insurance company to report the incident. She was further advised to have the locks on the residence changed, as well as the code for the automatic garage door opener.

Forgery (2913.31)

CheckSmart called the North College Hill PD to report there was a subject attempting to steal another person's identity. On arrival, PO Lasonczyk was directed to the suspect. PO Lasonczyk also spoke to an employee of CheckSmart. He stated the suspect was attempting to secure a loan from CheckSmart and had signed a check for collateral in



the amount of \$115.00. She was also in possession of a State of Ohio ID that did not belong to her. The check was signed in the name of the account holder for the checking account. The check was drawn on an account from 5/3rd Bank.

The CheckSmart employee made contact with the victim prior to my arrival. She stated she did not want to open a loan at CheckSmart, nor did she authorize any to open a loan in her name. PO Lasonczyk asked the suspect for her information and she did give the correct social security number. It was found the suspect is the daughter of account holder. The suspect was also found to have an 3 open warrants through Hamilton County, Clermont County, and Boone County, Ky.

The suspect was transported to the NCHPD and verbally advised of Miranda Right's. She stated she understood her rights and she did not have any questions for us. She also said she took her mother's check and ID to get money from CheckSmart. She was processed and transported to the HCJC.

PO Henn was called to the Kroger store for store employees holding a shoplifter. Upon arrival, he was met by the manager who advised the subject was still walking around the store and had not been approached by store employees. According to the manager, he observed the suspect select a can of beer from a store



display and conceal that can of beer in his coat pocket.

The suspect continued walking around the store, and was last seen at the deli counter ordering several packages of lunch meat. PO Henn remained in the breezeway of the store and observed the suspect enter the dog food aisle of the store and conceal at least two packages of what appeared to be lunch meat in his pants pockets. The suspect then selected a bag of cat food and walked to the "U-Scan" checkout lanes. The suspect paid for the cat food, as well as a package of cheese, and then exited the store passing all points of sale without

paying for the items he had concealed in his pockets. The suspect was stopped by store management and police. He initially denied having any items that weren't paid for. The arrestee was escorted to the office where he did admit to having some lunch meat he had not paid for. A pat down of the arrestee found a can of beer in his left inside coat pocket as well as several packs of cheese spread and lunch meat in his pants pockets. The arrestee was advised of his Miranda Rights and stated he was taking the lunch meat and cheese to feed his children.

The arrestee provided a name and a Social Security Number, which was later found to be false. While completing in-store paperwork for the apprehension, the arrestee became slightly disruptive, banging his head on a door. While escorting the arrestee out of the store, PO Henn advised the arrestee to "watch his step" as they approached a long staircase. Upon beginning their descent down the stairs, the arrestee dropped to the floor, stating "I can't believe you pushed me!" PO Henn assisted the arrestee back to his feet at which time he became increasingly belligerent and began cursing loudly.



The arrestee was warned several times to cease the turbulent behavior while being escorted to PO Henn's patrol car. The arrestee continued cursing and yelling at other customers.

The arrestee was transported to our station for processing. At our station, a records check was performed based on the personal information and his true identity was found. In view of the video surveillance system, the arrestee began banging his head on the wall and benches. The arrestee was warned several times to cease his turbulent behavior, and advised he may be shackled if his actions did not cease. The

determination was made to expedite transport to HCJC due to the arrestee's behavior. Upon placing the arrestee into the police cruiser, he purposely struck the vehicle with his head, just above the passenger side rear door, causing a dent in the door frame. During transport, the arrestee leaned over onto his left side and began making sounds as if he were choking. PO Henn stopped his cruiser at Hamilton Ave and S. Dixon in CPD5 and requested assistance as

well as EMS to respond. The arrestee was able to sit upright and began vomiting out the rear passenger side door. He continued to be alert and oriented, however he also continued to strike the inside of the vehicle with his head. Cincinnati Fire E51 responded and evaluated the arrestee for illness or injury. The determination was made that the arrestee appeared medically sound, and E51 personnel declined a life squad response. PO Henn continued transport at that time to HCJC. While enroute, the arrestee continued banging his head on the interior of the vehicle and yelling loudly. PO Henn requested extra personnel from HCJC to meet me at the sally port due to the arrestee's continued behavior.



that there was no one by that name, however one of the subject sat down on a chair on the porch, while the other remained standing. The victim states as he started to put his phone away, one of the suspects jumped up, punched him in his face, displayed a dark colored gun believed to be a BB gun, and took his phone. While this was in progress the other suspect attempted to attack the victim's friend, however the subject was unsuccessful as he fought back. Both subjects then fled the area last seen headed towards Waltham. The victim described one of the suspects as a M/B 16-18 years of age wearing a red hoodie; the other a M/B wearing a black hoodie, and faded Rock Revival jeans.

Upon arrival at HCJC, the arrestee was escorted into the jail and, after a search, was released to their custody.

Robbery (2911.02)

Officers were dispatched for a report of a subject that was robbed while on his front porch. Upon arrival, the victim stated that while on the porch with his friend, two (2) M/B subject came onto the porch asking if "Chris" was home. The victim stated

Theft (2913.02)

A complainant reported that while he was in Kroger, either at checkout #2 or US Bank, he set his wallet down and walked away. He stated he did not notice his wallet missing until he walked out to his car. He stated he checked both areas, all his pockets, and grocery bags and could not find

his wallet. PO Palmisano checked these areas, the trash cans in the area, and the area outside Kroger in the parking lot. He also could not find the missing wallet.

Kroger was asked to view the video tape in the event a person could be seen taking the wallet from checkout lane #2. The front end manager stated the video did show the next person in line taking the wallet left by the victim. She stated she will make a copy of the video tape and try to determine the name of the person who was checked out after the victim left.

The victim was advised to cancel his credit card, advise his bank of the theft, he could obtain a copy of his the report to obtain a new driver's license and Social Security Card.

Trouble Brewing

The complainant reported that while he was working on a family member's house, he saw a red laser facing in his direction. He also stated he could hear three (3) slight muffle shots and pinging in his area. He stated he could not see who was shooting, but the shots were coming from the northwest corner of a house on Parrish Ave.

PO Palmisano responded to the house and saw footprints in the snow at the northwest corner of the house. He responded to the front door and spoke to an adult male subject who was inside. He stated he was here staying with a friend's 12 year old son. PO Palmisano asked him if there was a BB gun in the house. He stated he did not know of one, and the juvenile stated there was not one in the house.

PO Palmisano explained to the adult what had occurred and that he needs to inform the parents when they arrive home.

Palmisano also told him that if there is a BB gun in the house, and an incident like this occurs criminal action will be taken. He stated he will inform the parents when they arrive home.

Tampering with Coin Machines (2911.32)

PO Henn was called to the NCH Car Wash for a B&E report. Upon

arrival, he was met by the reportee who states an unknown person or persons opened an air freshener vending machine attached to an exterior wall of the Car Wash and removed all its contents as well as the money inside. The subject(s) appear to have gained access to the inside of the machine by cutting the two pad locks. The reportee states the total value of the merchandise and money taken is approximately \$500.00.

The reportee was advised a report would be on file with our department to document the incident as well as the procedure to follow for obtaining a copy of that report.

Theft (2913.02)

A clerk at the United Dairy Farmer's stated that a M/W subject came into the store and took a package of pizza bites from the freezer and then put them in the micro-wave oven. When the clerk asked if the subject was going to pay for the pizza bites, the subject stated that he purchased them at the Save-A-Lot. When asked to produce the receipt the subject could not. The clerk stated she was going to call the police, and the subject then left the store walking south on Hamilton



Ave.

Criminal Damaging (2909.06)

On 11/16/2013 @ 1600 hours, PO Kodish was flagged down by the property owner of a house on Dallas Ave. The owner stated that he has rented out this residence for the last several years and that his most recent tenant, had just moved out. He stated that the tenant contacted him earlier in the week to advise that she had "officially" moved out and that she was awaiting a final inspection by the owner.

All parties arrived at the residence on 11/15/2013 (Friday) around 1000 hours for the final walk through. The tenant advised the owner that she noticed approximately three (3) holes around the base of the bay window, located on the east side of the house. It is believed to have been caused by an unknown person using a possible "BB" gun. It was also reported that the glass from the window was "splintered" or slightly cracked.

The property owner requested a report be generated for documentation purposes and for extra patrol around the property when available.
