ARRESTS MADE IN DECEMBER 2014

There were a total of 74 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2014.

37 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

37 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of DECEMBER 2014, 49 were residents of North College Hill and 25 were non-residents.


VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN DECEMBER 2014

There were a total of 48 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2014.

3 of these crashes involved injuries.

44 of the auto accidents were on the public roadways.

4 of the auto accidents were on private property.



TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

IN DECEMBER 2014

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$188,640.08 as of DECEMBER 2014.



There were a total of **112** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2014.

25 of the citations were for moving offenses (Speeding, Fail to stop at a Stop Sign, etc.)

24 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

18 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

45 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN DECEMBER 2014

There were a total of 7 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2014.



FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN DECEMBER 2014

There were a total of 45 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in DECEMBER 2014.

21 of these false alarms were to businesses.



24 of these false alarms were to residences.

395 Total false alarms have been received in 2014.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

Aggravated Robbery **(2911.01)**

Officers received a cell phone from Towne Taxi dispatch, reporting that one of their drivers was robbed and needed the police. They stated he was parked on DeArmand at Hamilton and would be in an orange taxi cab. Officers responded to the area but didn't initially locate the taxi cab. After checking the area officers located the taxi cab in front Dallas Ave.

The victim stated he received a dispatch for a fare on Dallas Ave. When he arrived at the location he called the phone



number given by the fare and advised that he had arrived. He advised that a male voice answered the phone. After making the call, the victim noticed 2 subjects come from the rear of another house Dallas and approach the rear of his car.

The victim described the subjects as male blacks, teens to early 20's, wearing blue jeans, dark hoodies, gloves, and ski masks. Both were armed with black handguns. When asked how he knew they were black since they were wearing ski mask, he stated they said, "If he was white they would kill him."

The subjects ordered the victim from his vehicle and ordered him to

empty his pockets. He complied with their orders and handed over his property. The victim stated that they told him to lie on the ground before they fled back behind the house on Dallas Ave.

By the time officers received the call 20 minutes had past and there was heavy foot traffic due to the start of school, so the decision was made not to use a police K9. PO Miller contacted HCCC to see if they would perform a GPS track on the victim's stolen cell phone. HCCC advised they could not as the incident was not life threatening.

Theft (2913.02)

The victim's mother called and asked police to respond for a theft report. The victim advised that several people have been in and out of the residence helping her move over the last week. She stated that although she didn't want to "point fingers" at anyone, she believed her ex-husband may be involved. The victim's ex-husband was allegedly seen going upstairs by the victim's mother. Victim's mother was not on scene. The victim stated that if the jewelry was located at any pawn

shops to let her know. She was advised to provide a detailed list of the missing items and to check at the local pawn shops herself. This was requested as she would "know" her jewelry and police would not. Officers also advised if the jewelry was located, to contact NCHPD so that it may be placed on hold.

Felonious Assault **(2903.11/Receiving** **Stolen Property** **(2913.51)**

On 8 December, 2014 at approximately 0530 am a 2003 Pontiac "Vibe" was stolen from



Clovernook Ave., in the city of MTHL. Upon reporting the theft to Mt. Healthy Police the complainants proceeded to look

for the vehicle in the neighborhood. They passed the vehicle on Clovernook Ave. around Angela Ave., whereby they turned and followed the vehicle southbound on Clovernook. The offender continued down Clovernook Ave., turning westbound

on Galbraith Rd., then southbound onto Tarawa Dr. The suspect stopped and parked the vehicle in front of a house on Tarawa, ran to the house, knocked on the door. When no one answered, he ran back to the vehicle and got in, and turned the car around. When the complainants turned around, the suspect pulled a handgun and fired a shot at the complainants. He proceeded northbound on Tarawa Dr. and again the westbound on Galbraith Rd., pulling into the condominium complex on Galbraith Rd. He got out, threw the handgun under a parked car and walked away down Galbraith. He was apprehended a short distance away by police.

Aggravated Robbery **(2911.01)**

On 12/8/14 at approximately 9:30 PM, officers were dispatched Savannah Ave to investigate an aggravated robbery at gunpoint. Upon arrival on scene, PO Smith made contact with the victim. The victim stated that approximately 10 minutes prior to PO Smith's arrival, he parked his silver Chrysler 200 on Savannah Ave, directly across from the bar. The victim then stated that while walking

to the front entrance, a black, male walked beside him, pointed a silver and black pistol at him, and demanded he give him his property. The victim then stated that the suspect fled the scene on foot traveling southbound on Savannah. The victim then stated that while running on Savannah, he saw the suspect meet up, then continue to flee with a second male, black. The victim described the suspect with the gun as dark skinned, approximately 30 years of age, 6'00, 210 lbs., wearing black jeans, a black shirt, black skull cap, and an Army style P coat. The victim described the second



suspect as dark skinned, and wearing a brown jacket with yellow stitching.

After speaking with the witness, several bystanders in the area stated that they observed a black, 90's model, 2 door Mercedes Benz drive past the bar several times around the time of the robbery. Minutes later, one person on scene stated that he observed a Mercedes matching the vehicle description parked on Emerson Ave. After approximately 15

minutes, Cincinnati Police units were able to locate the vehicle, and detain the driver. PO Smith ran the tag, and a male subject was attached to the vehicle. The Cincinnati Police unit out with the detained subject requested the victim be transported to his location for identification. Before transporting the victim, PO Smith showed him a picture of the registered owner on his MDC, and the victim stated that he was not the person who brandished the gun. Officers described the detained subject as wearing a black military style jacket with chevrons on his sleeves.

At approximately 10:20 PM, Springfield Township officers transported a subject that they detained matching the description of the suspect. With the subject removed from the vehicle, and PO Smith's cruiser spotlight pointed in his face, the victim stated that the detained subject was not the suspect who brandished the gun.

Theft (2913.02)

On 12/09/2014, PO Maus was dispatched to Walgreen's for a theft report. He arrived on scene and spoke to the manager, who reports an

unknown male black entered the store on 12/08/2014 at 2130 Hrs. and removed photographs from the photo lab center. The manager states the suspect dropped off pictures to be developed and returned and removed his photos from under the counter of the Photo Lab. He states the suspect placed the photos in a basket as he was shopping. He states the suspect then walked to the register and removed the photos from the cardboard box and left the store without payment. The photos are valued at \$75.66.

Criminal Trespass **(2911.21)**

Officers were dispatched to Kroger for a report of store employees having trouble with a subject that had been



arrested last night for theft.

We were advised by third shift officers that the arrested subject from

last night had been issued a Trespass Notification for Kroger at the time of that arrest. Upon arrival, PO Henn observed the arrestee exiting the

west doors of the store with a store employee close behind. PO Henn recognized the arrestee from previous contacts, and immediately made contact with him. He asked the arrestee his name, and after he identified himself, the arrestee was taken into custody. The arrestee stated he was at the store to visit his mother who was working in the Deli area of the store.



The arrestee was transported to our station for processing, and then transported to HCJC. The subject was in possession of a plastic bag containing several items; however, officers were unable to confirm with store employees that the items in his possession had been taken from the store. Those items were entered into our property room.

Criminal Damaging **(2909.06)**

On 12/14/2014 at 5:50pm, officers were dispatched for a report of one shot fired, followed by the sound of a window breaking. Upon officers' arrival, they spoke with the

complainant. He advised that he heard what he thought was a gun shot, followed by glass breaking. The complainant advised that his boys were playing outside when the incident occurred and he advised them to go inside. He advised that he checked the area and found his back window of his Ford Crown Victoria to be broken out. He also advised that his trunk was partially open because he was replacing the fire extinguisher.

After further investigation, officers could not confirm that the damage was caused by a bullet. Officers were unable to locate any bullet casings or evidence as to what may have caused the damage.

Auto Theft (2913.02)

The complainant responded to the North College Hill PD to report that subject(s) unknown did take her rental car without permission to do so. The vehicle was parked in front of the complainant's mother's house. It was parked there at approximately 1500 hours on 12/13/2014. The complainant's mother discovered the

vehicle was missing at approximately 0830 hours on 12/14/2014. The vehicle was locked and there were no keys inside. The vehicle was rented from Budget Rent a Car on E. Galbraith Rd. PO Lasonczyk called Budget and they advised they had not picked up the car. The vehicle was entered into RCIC as a stolen vehicle.

Theft of Firearm **(2913.02)**

PO Jones was dispatched to Centeridge Ave. for a theft report. While on the way to the address, he was updated that the theft report was updated to a theft of a firearm. As he arrived at the address he was met by the complainant. She stated that she returned home from work to find her gun missing as well as a Nook Tablet.

The complainant explained that while at work she received numerous calls from her son, wanting to go outside. She found this very odd since it would be more typical for her son to just leave without asking. When she returned home and noticed

her gun missing she questioned her son and her daughter. She found out that her son had had a group of friends over to the house. The son stated he didn't know what happened to the gun or who may have it.

PO Jones questioned the son, but he stated he didn't know where the gun was or who may have taken it. He said his mother lets him have friends over so he didn't know this was a problem. The complainant stated she only lets him have one friend over. PO Jones advised the son that if it is found he gave the gun to a friend or sold it that he would be

charged. He was also advised that if this gun is used in a robbery or if an officer is shot with it that he would be responsible and facing more charges. This did not prompt him to change his story or give

PO Jones any further information. The complainant stated she knew some of the kids and would be calling around to see if their parents could look for the weapon. PO Jones advised her to call police if she found any further information.

The boxes to both the firearm and the tablet were found with serial



numbers on them. The firearm was 9mm compact made by SCCY Industries. The complainant stated that the weapon should have 5 rounds loaded in it. The Nook tablet was a 16g and white in color. The firearm and table were both entered into LEADS and photos have been uploaded to the report.

He also gave a direct phone number to the victim so she could make contact with Forest Park PD in regards to an escort detail.

Assault (2903.13)

PO Elston was dispatched to an address on W. Galbraith Rd. for an Assault that had occurred. Upon arrival at given address, PO Elston made contact with the victim. She had minor cuts and bruises on her face. She explained to me that she got into an argument with her aunt about her child. The aunt began to hit the victim in the face. She fought back to defend herself. The fight took place in the parking lot outside of the apartment complex. When PO Elston arrived, the aunt was gone and enroute to an unknown address on Guild Ct. in Forest Park. The aunt still had the complainant's child with her. The complainant stated that she did not want to press charges. She also stated that she needed to go to Forest Park to pick up her child. PO Elston made contact with Forest Park PD and advised them of the situation.
