# ARRESTS MADE IN JANUARY 2015

There were a total of 78 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in JANUARY 2015.

42 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

36 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of JANUARY 2015, 48 were residents of North College Hill and 30 were non-residents.


# VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN JANUARY 2015

There were a total of 47 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in JANUARY 2015.

3 of these crashes involved injuries.

42 of the auto accidents were on the public roadways.

5 of the auto accidents were on private property.



# TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

## IN JANUARY 2015

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$13,249.00 as of JANUARY 2015.



There were a total of **148** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in JANUARY 2015.

**40** of the citations were for moving offenses (Speeding, Fail to stop at a Stop Sign, etc.)

**31** of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

**39** of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

**38** of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



# VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN JANUARY 2015

There were a total of 9 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in JANUARY 2015.



# FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN JANUARY 2015

There were a total of 32 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in JANUARY 2015.

9 of these false alarms were to businesses.



23 of these false alarms were to residences.

32 Total false alarms have been received in 2015.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

## **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **Theft of an Auto** **(2913.02)**

On 1/2/14 at 9:27 PM, Officers were dispatched to Tom's Drive Thru, 1906 W. Galbraith Rd, for a theft of a motor vehicle. Upon arrival, PO Smith made contact with the victim. The victim stated that his 2002 red, 4 door Honda Accord, was taken by the suspect while he entered Tom's Drive Thru. The victim then stated that the suspect was with another black female, who he described as approximately 20 years of age, medium complexion, wearing black yoga pants. The victim advised



officers that the keys were in the vehicle with the motor running prior to him entering the store. The victim could not provide a known direction of travel, but stated that the suspect could possibly reside in the 7900 block of Daly Rd with the second female. The victim also stated that he met the suspect a month prior on the Internet.

After speaking with the complainant, Officer Kodish checked in the area on Daly Rd, but could not locate the vehicle. Officer Kodish stated that all of the lights in the residence were off, and he did not attempt to make contact at the

residence. The vehicle was entered in LEADS and RCIC as stolen.

## **Theft (2913.02)**

PO Wilber was called to Kroger's customer service desk for report of a theft. When he arrived he made contact with the complainant. The complainant stated that she was putting her groceries into the back of her SUV, which was parked in the fire lane. While she was doing so, an F/B around the age of 18 asked if the complainant needed any help. The complainant told her she did not need help and that she was fine. The complainant stated that when she turned around to get more groceries out of the cart, the female took the complainant's purse out of the car. Ms. Elliott stated that the female then fled towards Perkins through the parking lot. The complainant stated that the female was wearing a black coat, black/dark blue jeans, thick eye glasses, rainbow colored beanie, and a rainbow colored purse. She tried to find the female, but came back to Kroger's to call the police.

PO Wilber got a manager from Kroger's to show him the video of the incident. While watching the video you could see what appeared to be the female in question next to the complainant's vehicle. The female

then waited for the complainant to turn away and walked to the rear of her vehicle. The female suspect was behind the vehicle for a little bit then fled on foot in a hurry towards Perkins. The video matches the complainant's account. The video at Kroger's could not give a picture of the suspects face or identifying features though.

## **Burglary (2911.12)**

PO Wilber was dispatched to the complainant's residence for a burglary report. When he arrived, he made contact with the complainant. The complainant stated that on 1/5/2015, an Xbox one, Xbox 1 controller, and an Xbox 1 game



(Dead Rising 3) was stolen. He stated it happened between 7:10 am and 3:30 pm. He did not call the police

then.

The complainant stated that on 1/7/2015 an Xbox 360 game (Dead Island) was stolen. He stated it happened between 7:10 am and

3:30pm. He did not call the police then.

The complainant then stated that on 1/13/2015, 2 Xbox 360 hard drives, and a black leather case that contained multiple video games and DVD's were stolen. He stated it happened between 12:00 pm-3:30 pm. He stated that their back door does not lock and only somebody that knows the house would know that. He also stated that after the first burglary, they hid all the stuff in his bedroom and only one of his younger brother's friends who come over to hang out would know where they put the gaming systems and games. His younger brother goes to NCH High School. The brother stated there are the only 2 people that have been over since they got the Xbox 1, and after they moved the systems and games. The complainant and his brother are certain that one of these 2 are to blame since they knew where everything was, knew they had all the games, knew their routine, and knew the back door doesn't lock.

All items stolen total a worth of \$2,350.00.



## **Criminal Damaging** **(2909.06)**

The complainant called the North College Hill Police Department and advised that subject(s) unknown did smash a candy bar into the gas tube leading to the gas tank of his Toyota Avalon. The vehicle was parked in the lot at approximately 1715 hours on 1/15/2015. When he saw the vehicle at approximately 0845 hours the next morning, he saw the gas tank door was open and the gas cap was out. That is when he noticed the smashed candy bar. It is unknown if any of the candy bar actually went in the gas tank. He also stated he does not have anyone that he knows of that is mad at him, though the people living in the apartment above his girlfriend in the same complex were evicted, so he does not know if they may be involved. There are no suspects at this time.

## **Assault/Aggravated** **Menacing** **(2903.13/2903.21)**

The victim stated that earlier in the evening of 1/24/2015, he was requested to change the locks on an apartment in the North Creek apartment complex by the manager due to a break in. While performing this task, he was questioned by an unknown heavy set black male as to why he was drilling out the lock. The victim indicated he was the maintenance man for the apartment and had been requested to change out the locks due to possible criminal activity.

The victim stated once he completed the job, he and his girlfriend drove to the Shell station, where he noted a white Buick pull in at an odd angle. The driver exited, grabbed him and struck him in the right side of his head and said "Why you breaking into my people's things?" He again told the subject he was not breaking into the apartment and was completing the task assigned him. The suspect, while leaving



made the comment that he was going to shot his dad and him next time they did that. The victim believes this unknown subject believes he was breaking into apartments, and has notified this department he has a

CCW permit and will begin carrying his firearm while working.

## **Attempted Aggravated Burglary (2911.11)**

On 1/24/15/ at 2300 hours, officers were dispatched to an attempted burglary that occurred 20 minutes prior. Upon arrival they were greeted by the home owner, who stated 3 male blacks attempted to gain entry into his house.

The complainant stated that while he was in bed he heard noises at his back door. He got up to investigate the noises and when he turned on the kitchen light, his rear doorbell rang. He opened his back door and 3 male blacks were walking in his backyard. He asked what they were doing and they said they were looking for a subject before exiting his yard into the alley behind his house. The complainant couldn't remember the name the subjects called out when he asked.

After entering his house, the complainant noticed that the window next to his rear door had been tampered with. The screen was pushed up and a smudge mark was seen on the glass as if a hand from

the outside was attempting to open the window.

The complainant described all the subjects as male blacks in their teens, wearing blue jeans and one was wearing a dark colored bubble coat.

## **Breaking & Entering** **(2911.13)**

On 01/26/15 at 0916 hours, PO Brown responded to a vacant residence to meet a real estate agent for a report of a theft of copper from the house. Upon arrival, he spoke with the agent, who advised that sometime between 01/16/15 at 0930 hours and 01/21/15 at 0930 hours, person(s) unknown, entered the house and removed copper piping from the basement, without the owner's permission. It appeared that the suspect(s) entered through the east side window into the kitchen. PO Brown observed the window for any signs of latent prints, however, the window and the area around the window had appeared that it had been wiped down, so no prints were left behind.

## **Theft of Identity** **(2913.49)**

On 01/26/15, the complainant came to the station to report that someone unknown had somehow obtained his family's tax information through Turbo Tax, and filed a return, using his family's information. The complainant contacted Turbo Tax and they advised that an attempt to submit a return was initiated on 01/17/15 and again on 01/23/15. He



stated that the first attempt had been denied by the IRS and the latest one is still pending,

but will probably be denied also, since contact had been made with Turbo Tax.

The complainant is concerned due to the fact that he and his wife's SSN# along with their four children's SSN#s were listed on the return. The complainant stated that he believes that some of the numbers had been changed slightly and the bank information for where the refund was to be deposited had been changed. The complainant was advised to make contact with the Social Security Administration, IRS and Credit Bureau to advise them of the issue.

# Negligent Assault (2903.14)

Officers were dispatched for a person accidentally shot. When they arrived, they made contact with the victim. She had an obvious gunshot wound to her leg just above her ankle. There was an entrance and what looked like an exit wound. The suspect was the person who owned and had possession of the firearm at the time of incident.

PO Wilber went with the suspect to secure the gun in question. PO Wilber followed the suspect upstairs where he retrieved the gun from the ground right at the top of the stairs. Upon checking the gun, PO Wilber could tell the hammer was broken off and the gun appeared to be broken to the point that it would no longer function properly.

The suspect stated that he was driving the car and when they got home he was getting out of the driver's seat and his gun fell out of his pocket and hit the curb next to the driver's door. He stated that he heard what sounded like a firecracker but didn't know where the sound came from. He later found that the victim was shot when he entered the house.

The victim stated that they got home and when they got out of the car she heard what sounded like a firecracker. She stated she didn't feel anything at first. She stated they went inside and that's when she noticed she had been shot.

To check the validity of the suspect's version of events, officers placed a laser on the curb to simulate the trajectory and path of a bullet if fired from this location. The laser projected an impact point on an officer's leg, while standing next to the rear passenger door. The impact point was in close proximity to the victim's wound.



Photographs were taken of the scene were taken, the suspect was cited for negligent assault, and the victim was transported by NCH EMS to UC Hospital.

## Domestic Dispute

On 01/27/15 at 1400 hours, PO Brown was dispatched to the area of W. Galbraith Rd. and Clovernook Ave. for domestic disturbance. The

complainant stated that her ex-boyfriend tried to hit her with his car, a tan Buick, and then drove south on Clovernook Ave. towards W. Galbraith Rd. Upon arrival in the area, PO Brown did not see the complainant, nor did he see the suspect vehicle. He drove around the area in an attempt to find the complainant, but was not successful. He requested the Hamilton County Communications Center to call the complainant back to get her whereabouts. Dispatch advised they attempted to call, but got voice mail on callback.

Moments later, dispatch advised that they made another attempt to make contact with the complainant. They did make contact and the complainant advised that she was at home. PO Brown then responded to that location and was met by the complainant outside the building. He asked her what had happened. She advised that the two were in the car together and got into an argument. As they approached Clovernook Ave. on W. Galbraith Rd, the ex-boyfriend told her to get out of the car and walk the rest of the way home. She proceeded to get out of the car at the corner of W. Galbraith Rd. and Clovernook Ave. Once out of the car,



she said that she was yelling and cussing at him and before she could shut the door, her ex-boyfriend accelerated to leave. When the car was in motion, the right front portion of his car brushed her left leg. She stated that he actually turned the car into her as if to run her over. She said that he proceeded northbound on Clovernook Ave. and made a "U" turn at Columbine Ct. and then headed south on Clovernook Ave. on the wrong side of the road, towards her general area. She stated that is the time she decided to call 911.

She said that she believes that he is obsessed with her and can't let go of her. PO Brown asked her if she was injured and if she needed to be seen by EMS. She said that she is a little sore, but does not want to be seen by EMS. He then asked her how she wished to handle this incident. She asked how she would go about obtaining a restraining order, because more importantly than anything, she just wanted him to stay away from her and make him abide by that. PO Brown advised that she had a couple of options, one of which being, filing a report with NCHPD, obtaining a copy of same and responding to the HC Clerks Office to begin the process of obtaining a

CPO. He advised that her second option was to file an incident report, file an affidavit, filing charges on him and her testifying in court about the incident. She immediately chose to file the report and obtaining a CPO. PO Brown also advised that if he shows up at her residence, that she needed to call 911, so that the Police can make contact with him and trespass him from the property.
