# **ARRESTS MADE IN OCTOBER 2015**

There were a total of **103** arrests made within the City of North College Hill in OCTOBER 2015.

**60** of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

**43** of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of OCTOBER 2015, **59** were residents of North College Hill and **44** were non-residents.

# VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN OCTOBER 2015


There were a total of 50 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in OCTOBER 2015.

4 - of these crashes involved injuries.

28 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

13 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

9 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



# TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

## IN OCTOBER 2015

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$114,742.00 as of OCTOBER 2015.



There were a total of **97** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in OCTOBER 2015.

**41** of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

**19** of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

7 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

30 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



# VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN OCTOBER 2015

There were a total of 13 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in OCTOBER 2015. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



# FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN OCTOBER 2015

There were a total of 28 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in OCTOBER 2015.

14 of these false alarms were to businesses.



14 of these false alarms were to residences.

328 Total false alarms have been received in 2015.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

## **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **Assault (2903.13)**

Police were called for a return run to Noble Ave. for a person with a stick and getting ready to fight. As PO K. Ryan turned onto the street, he observed the resident and suspect fighting in the driveway between two parked vehicles, and near the garage. As PO Ryan approached the address, he saw the neighbor across the street running to the aid of the complainant. PO Ryan exited his vehicle and went to the three of them, where he observed the suspect face up with the complainant and the neighbor on top of him holding him down. He handcuffed the suspect



and he complied with PO Ryan's orders and rolled over on to his belly face down. PO Ryan handcuffed him and had him stay on the ground until other officers arrived on scene. Once other officers arrived he helped the suspect up and had him sit in the rear of my police car. The resident spoke to other officers and did have a minor laceration to the right side of his belly from the struggle. A life squad was called for the complainant and he was bandaged for the injury. He did refuse transportation to the hospital.

The suspect was transported to the North College Hill police station where paperwork was completed for the arrest. He was

then transported to the Hamilton County Justice Center by Officer Six and Officer Kilgore.

### **Assault (2903.13)**

Officers were called to Noble Ave. for the complainant having trouble with the same subject as yesterday. On arrival, PO Lasonczyk spoke with the complainant. She advised the suspect, who is her cousin, had returned today, after he was released from jail (He was arrested for assaulting the complainant's husband yesterday) and started to argue with her about her not being his monthly payee any longer for when he receives his government assistance check. While they were arguing, she advised the suspect that he needed to leave as he was told the previous day, not to return, especially since he does not live there.

The argument continued and the complainant's husband came outside. At that point, the suspect walked up and started to argue with him. The suspect then punched victim on the left cheek. He then ran from the scene. He was located a short time later by PO Six. The suspect was

placed in custody and was charged with Assault, Aggravated Trespass, and Menacing by Stalking. He was then transported to the Justice Center by PO Six.

### **Criminal Damaging (2909.06)**

On 10/05/2015 @ 1845 hours, PO Kodish was dispatched to W. Galbraith Rd. for the report of several juveniles who were trespassing in the rear yard of the address listed. More specifically, upon his arrival arrival, PO Kodish was met by the reportee, who stated that approximately three (3) male black juveniles were observed in the rear yard, jumping on a trampoline. She stated that her mother is the owner of the residence and that they have had numerous incidents in the past where juveniles are observed in the rear yard, jumping on a trampoline.



On today's date, the complainant looked out a rear window of the residence and observed three (3) male juveniles (possibly between the ages of 10 yoa to 14 yoa) jumping on the trampoline, which is located in the rear yard near the wood line. She stated that she and her mother have

had to yell at these kids in the past for being in the rear yard without permission. The juveniles in question are not known to the complainant or her mother but they believe they live in the neighborhood somewhere.

After the complainant yelled at the juveniles and told them to leave, it was reported that the juveniles caused damage to the protective net which surrounds the trampoline. It appears that the net, which is tied in a knot at the base of the trampoline, was pulled / tugged on by the juveniles who subsequently caused the netting to rip / fray. The complainant was advised to contact our department if they observed the juveniles in their rear yard again.

## **Person with a Knife**

On 10/05/2015 @ 2025 hours, officers were dispatched to the area of Northridge Dr. & Clovernoll Dr. for a male white, wearing a gray shirt and black pants that was in possession of a machete. Officers searched the area and located the subject walking in front on Clovernoll Dr. He was observed holding two (2) swords in his left hand and a red colored duffel bag in his right hand.



Officers ordered him to drop the swords at gun point, which he immediately complied.

Upon further investigation, it was discovered that the suspect had in his possession two (2) decorative/collectible swords and the duffel bag contained a few decorative/collectible dagger type knives. The suspect told officers that the swords and knives were his personal collection and that he was hoping to sell them to a friend of his that lives in Arlington Heights. He further stated that he had grabbed the swords and knives from his house and then proceeded to walk to Huntington Bank to await a friend that was allegedly enroute to pick him up and then transport him to Arlington Heights.

After waiting a short while in the parking lot of Huntington Bank, he stated that his friend who was supposed to pick him up had been called in to work and would be unable

to respond to the bank parking lot. After receiving that message, he proceeded to walk home and that was when police arrived on scene. The subject was transported to his residence and then released with his property.

## **Theft (2913.02)**

The complainant, who is a loss prevention manager for Kroger, called to report a theft by deception that occurred at the Kroger's here in North College Hill. Complainant advised she learned of the suspect taking items off of the shelf in the store and then going to the service desk to return them. The suspect then places a note inside the front edge of the counter of the service desk and then tells the clerk he needs to return the items. The note he writes said he is from a local business, in this case the Mt. Healthy Schools, and he is returning the items and is to be given cash for the return. The suspect places the amounts of the items on the note and signs the note with a manager's name, in this case "Mike". He then tells the clerk that he was told to tell the clerk there would be a note for him for the return of the items and lets the clerk find the note he left as if it was left by the manager. The complainant advised she has had this suspect perform this theft by deception several times in the past over several months in several Kroger locations. Complainant also advised she has several videos of him involved in this. At this time the



complainant does not have any information on the suspect's identity.

## **Breaking & Entering (2911.13)**

While on routine patrol, PO Jones could hear a siren sounding in the distance. The siren continued for a few minutes and made me believe it may be a store alarm and not some type of emergency vehicle. He checked the area of Hamilton Ave. and Goodman Ave., trying to see which business the alarm was going off, when he was dispatched to Clean Getaway for an intrusion alarm.

Upon his arrival, the business appeared to be secure. Officer Miller noticed the drive up window was locked. While looking into the business you could see a desk drawer that looked to have been knocked to the ground and the cash register open. Officers climbed through the window and checked the business. No one was found and all other doors were secure.

While inside, officers noticed that the register was open but only had the coins currency remaining. A few coins were also dropped on the

ground. Dispatch and officers attempted to get a key holder to respond with no success. Officer Miller did find a phone number in Pamet, but it was a past employee. The past employee did state that the cash register is left open at night with only coin currency left inside. Being suspicious that a crime had been committed it was treated as a break in and was processed for fingerprints.



Multiple prints were lifted and photographs were taken. The business was kept secure except for the front drive up window due to there being no way to secure all doors and the window.

## **Burglary (2911.12)**

Officers were dispatched to respond to a report of a burglary that had just occurred. The complainant stated that as he walked up the stairs from the basement, he observed what he thought were two male blacks, possibly in their teens, quickly walked out the rear door. The complainant described the first suspect as a younger teen, male black, wearing a black hoodie. The last suspect was described as a younger male black, teens, wearing a black hoodie with

yellow seams of stripes at the seams. Both males had their hoods covering their heads, so he really did not get a good look at either one, however, the last suspect out the door, quickly looked at the complainant, but the complainant did not recognize the suspect and couldn't describe any details other than he did not have facial hair. Both suspects left through the rear door and then in an unknown direction from there.

Police units were in the area, but did not observe anyone that matched the description. According to the complainant, there didn't appear to be anything missing, the complainant doesn't believe that they were inside long enough, due to the fact that the complainant's older brother was on the couch in the living room, watching television and taking a nap. Additionally, the complainant thinks the suspects were startled because he was walking up the stairs into the kitchen that is directly adjoined to the living room with no other doors or access points in the kitchen. There were no signs of forced entry and when asked, the complainant and his older brother advised that the door was unlock because they were in the house.

## Possession of Drugs (2925.11)

PO Wilber, while on routine patrol on Hamilton Ave., observed a car with KY plates cut over to the right into the other lane cutting off another car and almost causing a wreck. The car did not properly use their turn signal and changed lanes improperly. The car turned into the gas pumps at Kroger's on Hamilton Avenue. PO Wilber initiated his lights and got behind the car at the pumps. When he pulled up

on the car the back right passenger jumped out of the car quickly. It appeared that the passenger was getting ready to run. The driver of the car also got out of the car and walked back towards PO Wilber's

car and leaned up against the trunk of his car. That is when the male passenger who jumped out the back started to walk away from the scene, towards the cashier stand. PO Wilber then told the male passenger to come here because this is a traffic stop and he can't have him walking around out of sight. PO Wilber then got the driver's license of the driver. He then asked the male passenger who jumped out the back for his identification. The male stated he did not have it. PO Wilber then asked for



his name. The male gave me the name which was later found to be a false name. Because of how nervous the subject was, PO Wilber just asked him if he had warrants. He stated that he did have a warrant. PO Wilber then put the subject in handcuffs and later found his identification inside his wallet. He gave a fake name at first to try and keep PO Wilber from finding out about his warrant. The driver of the car then agreed to let officers search the back area of the car where the other subject was sitting. During

that search, a greenish bag containing 2 spoons and a tie off band used for the ingestion of heroin was found. Also located in a brown paper bag was multiple pieces of drug paraphernalia 4 needles, mini cotton pieces for filters, 2 metal containers to heat up heroin, Narcan, and sterile water.

PO Wilber then pulled out the female front passenger. While talking to her and the male passenger, trying to figure out where they were coming from, the male told PO Wilber that there was a can in the front passenger side of the car that was used to put heroin on to get it into a needle. He then advised the driver again of what he just learned and that

if it was okay to search the car for any other drug paraphernalia. He did locate the can on the floor board of the front passenger area. While looking for the can and in the area of the can, the purse of the female subject was open and you could see an orange needle cap in plain view inside her purse. PO Wilber then confronted the female about what he saw. She told him several times that there is not a needle in her purse. She even said you want me to show you. PO Wilber said "Yes." she grabbed her purse from the car and proceeded to take everything out of it. The needle cap was located but nothing else was found as she was taking the stuff out. PO Wilber then asked the female if he could check for himself. She gave PO Wilber permission. When he looked in her purse he located a slit on the side of the lining and when he looked through the slit you could see a needle hidden between the lining and the outside of the purse. PO Wilber then placed the female under arrest for drug paraphernalia. Also located in the car was a prescription for another female, which PO Wilber took for safekeeping since there was



nobody in the car the name on the bottle. PO Wilber took both subjects back to the PD.

While back at the PD processing both defendants PO Wilber found 0.1 grams of heroin in the wallet of the female wrapped up in a brown piece of paper.

## **Robbery (2911.01)**

At approximately 0955 hrs. on 10/28/15, Hamilton County Communications Center received multiple hold up alarms from the 5/3rd bank, 6800 Hamilton Av. Officers were updated while enroute that it was a good Aggravated Robbery, with a gun displayed. The money was taken by an unknown offender.

Security pictures and footage was obtained from security and attached. A perimeter was set up and a k9 from COTP responded, but could not search due to the weather. He did do an article search to no avail. Witness's stated the offender did leave across the street, past Fricker's and Frisch's across Galbraith Rd.
