ARRESTS MADE IN DECEMBER 2015

There were a total of 75 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2015.

44 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

31 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of DECEMBER 2015, 41 were residents of North College Hill and 34 were non-residents.


There were a total of 39 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2015.

1 - of these crashes involved injuries.

29 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

8 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

1 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

IN NOVEMBER 2015

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$134,188.00 as of DECEMBER 2015.



There were a total of **52** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2015.

14 of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

12 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

4 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

22 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN DECEMBER 2015

There were a total of 5 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in DECEMBER 2015. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN DECEMBER 2015

There were a total of 22 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in DECEMBER 2015.

5 of these false alarms were to businesses.



17 of these false alarms were to residences.

371 Total false alarms have been received in 2015.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

Burglary (2911.12)

Officer Six responded to West Galbraith for a burglary report. The victim stated he left for work around 0600 hrs. and returned around 1530 hrs. When he returned home, he found the rear door of the residence open. The kitchen door was forced the wrong way and broken. The pins had been removed in an attempt to get the door open. Taken in the offense was a 50" television of an unknown make and model. Forced entry was made via the basement window. The suspects appeared to encounter the door leading to the kitchen and found it locked. They then located

tools owned by the homeowner and forced the kitchen door the wrong way. It appeared as though, they suspect left from the rear door.

Robbery (2911.02)

Officers were dispatched to Walgreen's for a report of a purse snatching that had just occurred. The suspect was described as a male, black with multi-colored shoes, who was last seen running eastbound on W. Galbraith Rd. On arrival, PO Lasonczyk found the victim inside the store. He also spoke to a witness, who stated the suspect was



wearing a red hoodie and tan pants and was last seen running behind the houses next to Walgreen's. The victim advised that after she walked out the front door of the store, she was looking down and saw the multi-colored shoes, standing near the Propane cabinet on the south side of the store. She then saw a M/B subject wearing the red hoodie (with the hood up) and tan pants that jumped out at her. She also saw a black "square" handgun, possibly a semi-automatic in the subject's hand. The subject told the victim "Give me your purse!" The victim had her car keys and merchandise bags in her right hand and her purse on her left arm. The suspect then grabbed the purse from the victim and took off running behind the white house next to Walgreen's.

While a perimeter was being set up, and a K-9 was enroute from Springfield Township, PO Maus, who was working an off duty detail at North Creek Apartments advised on the city band radio that he had a subject that was running in the tree line at that location. He requested officers respond to the apartment complex, but they were unable to locate to subject that was running in the woods. When the K-9



arrived at Walgreen's, PO Palmisano "shadowed" the dog and the track led them to North Creek, though due to a large amount of foot traffic on the property, they had to terminate the track without finding the suspect.

Taken in the offense were a green leather purse and its contents. The contents, per the victim included her wallet, driver's license, 2 Chase Bank credit cards, \$150.00 in cash, a Samsung Galaxy S3 cell phone, her house keys and extra car key, her checkbook, and personal papers.

Vehicular Vandalism **(2909.09)**

A complainant advised he was north bound Hamilton Ave. in the right (curb) lane and observed four to five male juveniles walking on the curb of the roadway north bound and on the sidewalk. The complainant advised as he passed the group of juveniles one of them threw what appeared to be a rock into the path of the vehicle and struck the vehicle in the front of the hood for the vehicle. The complainant advised he stopped his vehicle as soon as he saw the rock thrown and strike the vehicle and the group of juveniles ran from the area of the roadway. He

advised he turned into the business driveway that he was in front of and followed the parking lot around to follow the group of juveniles as they ran across the property and into the wooded area behind the business. He advised he stopped his vehicle, exited, and stopped one of the juveniles. He then called the police and waited there for police to arrive.

After PO Ryan arrived and secured the first suspect, a second suspect walked out of the wooded area where the complainant advised he ran to. The complainant, PO Ryan, and PO Six, observed the damage to the vehicle's hood and took a written statement from the complainant. The two juveniles were transported to the NCHL Police station where charges were filed for Vehicular Vandalism.

Theft/Drug Possession **(2913.02/2925.11)**

Officers were dispatched for a possible theft involving the moving men who were currently on scene. When officers arrived, the complainant was standing in the street waiting for officers while two male whites were standing next to a box truck.

The complainant stated that she had placed three diamond rings in the basement bathroom drawer to hide them while she moved. She said when she went to retrieve them they were gone. The only persons that had access to them were her kids, her sister, and the suspects who were helping her move.



The complainant stated that the suspects had asked her for some of the job money because one suspect needed to pay for his blood pressure medicine. The complainant agreed and the suspects left and didn't return for 3 hours. The suspects were employees of a personal friend of the complainant's.

When PO Miller spoke to the suspects, both denied taking or seeing any rings, citing why would they steal from their boss's friend. While talking with the suspects they stated PO Miller could check them if he wanted. Accepting their offer, PO Miller searched one suspect and didn't locate any jewelry on his person. When he went to check the second suspect, PO Miller noticed him toss something on the ground followed by the first suspect attempting to cover that item with a tool bag. PO Miller moved the tool

bag and found the item to be the suspect's wallet. PO Miller retrieved the wallet and located a folded piece of paper containing white powdery substance that PO Miller believed was heroin. The suspect was arrested and Mirandized. After being Mirandized, PO Miller asked the suspect if the substance he found was heroin and he stated, "Yes".

The suspect's boss, the complainant's friend, and owner of the box truck arrived scene. He gave consent to search the truck. Inside the truck was a black coat that the arrestee identified as his own. Inside the coat pocket was a folded piece of paper containing two separate pieces of folded paper. Both pieces of paper contained an off-white powder/rock substance that PO Miller believed to be heroin. When PO Miller confronted the arrestee about the substance he stated it wasn't heroin it was fleece (Fake drugs.) PO Miller asked him if he was fleecing people and he stated no he got fleeced. He stated he purchased the substance in Price Hill and believes it is fake heroin. A field test of each substance showed that the substance contained heroin. The subject was charged with drug possession and transported to CJC.

Theft (2913.02)

The complainant called from Louisiana and stated that unknown subject(s) had taken her Ohio Eppicard and withdrew \$300.00 from 2 different ATM's. One ATM was at the United Dairy Farmer's on Kemper Meadow in Forest Park, where \$202.50 was withdrawn. The other ATM was at an MDS/Marathon Express on Montgomery Rd., where \$102.50 was withdrawn. The complainant stated she noticed the card



was missing on November 28, 2015. She reported the card as missing to Ohio Eppicard on December 1, 2015. On December 14, 2015, she looked at her statement and found the charges, both of which she did not incur. Both charges occurred on December 1, 2015. The complainant left for December 7, 2015 and she stated she is not sure when, if ever she will return.

Criminal Damaging (2909.06)

Officers Six and Elston responded to the area of the North College Hill

Senior Center for a report of an auto accident. Officers met with the victim, who stated he was driving south on Clovernook after leaving his house. Another vehicle had approached him and tried to go around him. The suspect vehicle attempted this several times. At one point the suspect vehicle attempted to pass and nearly struck an oncoming vehicle. When the suspect vehicle abruptly jerked out of oncoming traffic, it struck the complainants vehicle. The victim then slowed down and the suspect vehicle went around.

As they approached the intersection of Clovernook and Norman the two stopped at the stop sign. The suspect exited his vehicle and began to verbally attack the victim, while the victim was inside his vehicle. At one point the suspect actually yanked open the driver's door according to the victim. The suspect continued to yell at the victim which eventually led to the suspect kicking the side of the victims' car. The suspect then sped off. The victim followed the suspect and obtained his license plate. Once he was able to do this he called police and pulled over.

The suspect was identified and located at the listed address on his license plate. He stated the event had


occurred almost exactly as the victim stated. He stated the only difference was the victim actually struck his car. The suspect was cited for criminal damaging and released.

Menacing (2903.22)

The complainant, who is an employee of the United Dairy Farmer's advised an intoxicated customer with whom she has had trouble in the past came into the store tonight and wanted to "apologize" so he walked up behind her and gave her a kiss on the cheek. She pushed him away and he became upset. He walked to the register, but stated to the complainant that he was going to have his sister come to the store to fight her. He then left with another female. The complainant stated she did not wish to file charges, but only wanted him banned from the store. PO Lasonczyk advised her to call the police immediately should he return.

Aggravated Menacing (2903.21)

The complainant responded to the North College Hill PD with her mother



to report that she has received threatening text messages and today, she received a threatening letter. The text messages were received on 12/18/2015. The text messages stated that they were going to kill the complainant's mother and her cousin.

On 12/22/2015, the complainant received a letter threatening, again, to kill her mother and her cousin, as well as the complainant. The letter also said that the author would burn down the complainant's house.

The complainant and her mother believe the threats may have come from a family member, though at this time this cannot be verified. The letter has been submitted for fingerprinting.

Burglary (2911.12)

The reportee advised that person(s) unknown did throw a rock through the glass door window, located on the northwest corner of Lake Nina Restaurant. Once inside the unknown person(s) may have taken bottles of alcohol and change from a change drawer. An inventory will be completed and the reportee will notify the Police of what items were missing.

The reportee stated she is not sure if the alcohol bottles on the shelves, or the cash register drawer were touched by the suspects. She stated the alcohol bottles and the cash drawer were handled a lot before the burglary.

The reportee stated there is a camera that records activity in the room where the entry was made. She was asked to provide a copy of the recording to the Police Department. She stated as soon as the owner comes back to work, she will get him to make a copy.

Arson (2909.03)

PO Jones was requested to respond to the scene of a vehicle fire per NCH Fire Dept. The fire run was a transfer from Cincinnati dispatch. Upon arrival, the scene commander stated the fire was suspicious. He stated that when they arrived there was a strong odor of gasoline present. The rear of the vehicle was engulfed in flames but once extinguished they observed that it may have started on the outside of the vehicle on top of the truck. They believed someone



may have poured gasoline on top of the truck area and ignited it.

PO Jones spoke to the owner, who stated her and her mother were asleep in the living room. They were woken up by the flashing lights of the fire trucks and then realized their car was on fire. The owner believes this to have been arson as well and stated she knows who it may possibly be. She stated she has had issues with a girl who works with her. She has also received death threats in the mail and her vehicle tires have been slashed as well as her mothers in the past. She believes this all to have been committed by this person. PO Jones ran the name through his mobile police computer and the victim positively identified the suspect. She also had pictures on her phone of the suspect so she already knew who she was and what she looked like due to working for the same employer.



Lt. Petrocelli responded to relieve PO Jones from his position so he could take other calls as he waited for the Hamilton County Arson Task Force to respond. The area was also roped off for scene security.

Upon the arrival of the arson team they collected multiple items. The investigator stated he would submit the items to the crime lab to check for an accelerant. He stated he will update police with the results.

PO Jones responded to the residence of the possible suspect and located two cars in the driveway. He observed no evidence in plain sight in either vehicle but there was a suspicious ashy substance on the driver side door and window of one vehicle. The substance was shown to the arson team to which they stated it was not related. This incident is still under investigation.
