# ARRESTS MADE IN AUGUST 2016

There were a total of 67 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in AUGUST 2016.

33 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

34 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of AUGUST 2016, 28 were residents of North College Hill and 39 were non-residents.

## IN AUGUST 2016


There were a total of 47 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in AUGUST 2016.

4 - of these crashes involved injuries.

33 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

3 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

7 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



# TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

## IN AUGUST 2016

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$88,381.00 as of AUGUST 2016.



There were a total of 57 traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in AUGUST 2016.

27 of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

8 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

10 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

12 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



# VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN AUGUST 2016

There were a total of 10 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in AUGUST 2016. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



# FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED

## IN AUGUST 2016

There were a total of 39 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in AUGUST 2016.

20 of these false alarms were to businesses.



19 of these false alarms were to residences.

219 Total false alarms have been received in 2016.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

## **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **Burglary (2911.12)**

Officers Six and Elston responded to West Galbraith Road to see a complainant for a burglary report. Officers met with the victim, and she stated that she had been gone from approximately 8:13 am and when she returned at around 6:00 pm, she found her house had been burglarized. The suspect appeared to have entered through the rear window. This window leads into the master bedroom and is pretty well secluded.



Once inside the suspect went from the bedroom to the living room and tripped the alarm. Fearing the now active, audible alert from the alarm, the suspect ripped it from the wall. It appears as though the suspect then panicked and tried to leave via the side door. This is evident by the alarm unit being located near the side door. The residence has a security sliding door and the suspect was not able to open it. Not being able to leave via the side door, the suspect then appears to have exited the front door.

After reviewing the crime scene, Officers located several finger prints on the side door. Officers also located several fresh smudges on the rear window. Although there were no discernable prints from the window, Officers observed some of the smudges appeared to have a buildup of oily residue. The residue was at the end of the smudges, where the finger prints would've been. Officers collected DNA and finger prints from these areas for submission. The alarm box was also taken for finger printing. The front door was not printed as it had been heavily manipulated prior to police arrival. The victim also stated nothing appeared to be taken at the time of report.



made her angry. She lunged towards him and began throwing punches. He then stated that he pushed, attempting to get away from the assault. The male stated that the altercation moved into the bedroom, where he pushed the female away from him, causing her to fall into a glass entertainment center cover. Fresh blood marks were also observed by on the glass cover. The male advised the female then left the residence, and was currently in the apartment next door.

Lt. Maus attempted to make contact with the female at the next door apartment. A male tenant answered the door and stated that she did knock on his door, but he refused to let her inside his apartment.

## **Domestic Violence (2919.25)**

On 8/3/16 at 4:17 am, Officers were dispatched for a report to investigate domestic trouble between a male and female couple. Upon arrival on scene, fresh blood streaks and blood spatter were observed on the door and doorknob of the apartment. Contact was made with the male participant. He stated that he and his girlfriend were sitting on the patio that he said something that

The female was eventually located in the middle doorway on the basement floor of the complex. Her face was covered in blood. A large laceration was present near the bridge of her nose. She originally stated to Officers that she fell inside the apartment. North College Hill EMS was dispatched to the scene and rendered first aid for the laceration. While receiving treatment for her injuries, she stated that male choked her, struck her in the face,

and then pushed her into the glass cover. She then stated that she said something to the male which made him angry. She advised that she wanted to file criminal charges against the male subject for Domestic Violence. The female was transported to Mercy West Hospital by EMS for further medical evaluation.

Officers returned to the apartment, attempting to take the male subject into custody for Domestic Violence, but did not receive a response at the door. Domestic Violence charges for the male were filed and are pending.

### **Theft (2913.02)**

Officers were dispatched to the listed location for a theft that had just occurred. The complainant, an employee at the Family Dollar, advised that a light skinned, female black, wearing a white and black dress, carrying a brown purse, just took items from the sales shelf and left the store without paying for them. The suspect headed east on Goodman towards Rose's. PO Brown observed a subject who matched the description of the suspect, walking in the lot of Rose's. He stopped the subject and asked her over to my cruiser. He



asked her what was in the purse. She said, "Sir, I have to feed my kids". PO Brown asked again what she took from Family Dollar. She said "Lysol". He retrieved the 4 cleaning items from her purse and transported her back to Family Dollar.

Upon speaking with the manager at Family Dollar, it was decided by the manager, that they did not wish to prosecute as long as they got their products back and intact. The manager, however, wanted the subject trespassed from the property. The items, with a total value of \$11.26, were returned to Family Dollar and the subject was trespassed from the property and then sent on her way.

### **Theft From a Vehicle** **(2913.02)**

On 8/10/16 at 7:28 AM, PO Smith responded to Cordova Ave to meet with a complainant. Contact was made with the Complainant. The Complainant stated that she parked her 2008 Pontiac G6 across from her residence at 9:30 PM on 8/9/16. Upon walking to her vehicle at approximately 7:10 AM on 8/10/16, she discovered that someone entered the vehicle and removed \$10 in change.

The Complainant's husband stated that he parked his 1984 Dodge Ram across from the residence at approximately 1 AM. When he went outside to check on the theft from his wife's vehicle, discovered that several items had been ransacked, and two gas cans were removed from the bed of the truck. A brown paper bag containing several items from the vehicle was also located under the vehicle.

Per both Complainant's, both vehicle were left unlocked overnight.

### **Aggravated Menacing** **(2903.21)**

On 8/13/16, a complainant reported that 2 M/B's began banging on the door. When she answered the door the M/B in the green shirt stated they were her to "Fuck up 'Lucky,' and they were going to kill him." The suspects also stated they were going to shoot the place up. PO Palmisano asked the complainant if they showed a gun. She stated she did see a gun that the suspect in the green shirt was wearing. The gun was in his belt line. The complainant stated they were seen getting in a small black car going south on Simpson. The area



was check and the vehicle was not found.

### **Discharge Firearm into** **Habitation (2923.162)**

Officers were dispatched to Shollenberger Ave. for someone shooting at the house. When PO Wiber arrived, he met with the complainant. She was hysterical and yelling. PO Wilber calmed her down enough to get that a black dodge neon car with 4 M/B's inside, shot at her house. He noticed a bullet hole in the glass screen door. The bullet hole traveled through the glass, through the door, and into the wall inside. The complainant's grandson was also inside. The grandson was actually standing at the front door when the shots rang out. He kept saying he didn't know who did it. By his reactions you could tell he knew who did it, but just did not want to say anything. The grandson, who was the one being shot at, was uncooperative the whole time.

Upon looking in the street, PO Wilber located three 9mm shell casings that were recently fired from a gun. Pictures were also taken from the scene of the bullet holes. Without a cooperating witness

officers are unable to go forward with any charges.

## **Possession of Marihuana** **(2925.11)**

Officers received a call about possible drug activity on 7117 Hamilton Ave. They located the car in question and positively identified it from the plate provided. As they turned around in the lot, they saw the car leaving the lot. As they pulled away PO Elston noticed the strong odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. There were no other vehicles in the area. Officers stopped the vehicle. As they approached, a strong odor of marijuana still protruded from the open windows of the vehicle.

PO Elston pulled the passenger out and explained to him why they were stopped. The subject was immediately honest with PO Elston and explained to him that he and the female he was with were smoking a joint. He explained to me that it was his "weed". PO Elston asked him if he had any more in the vehicle and he said no. PO Elston searched the vehicle and located the joint in the ash tray in the cup holder. He also



noticed a large White Castle cup in the other cup holder. He opened it up and located two large plastic bags with green leafy substance believed to be marijuana in them. PO Elston went back and talked to the male subject. He immediately claimed responsibility for the two bags.

PO Elston patted him down and placed him into the back of his cruiser. Officers obtained the female's information and spoke to her mom, who arrived on scene. The female was then released to her mother. PO Elston wrote the male subject a Minor Misdemeanor ticket for possession of marijuana and released him. The male subject was very respectful and honest with me throughout the duration of this incident.

## **Criminal Mischief (2909.07)**

On 8/19/20146, officers were dispatched to Clovernook Ave. for a vehicle tampering in progress. Officers were advised that the perpetrator is a male blacking wearing jeans and has a flashlight. Officers arrived on scene and observed the dome light on in a

vehicle parked in the driveway of a house on Clovernook.

Upon inspecting the vehicle the driver's door was partially ajar. Another vehicle in the driveway was found to have its contents rifled through. Contact was made with the witness who stated that he saw the suspect going through both vehicles but when he went to retrieve his phone to call 911 and returned the suspect was gone.

Contact was made with the vehicle's owner and made aware of the situation. The owner reported nothing of value was taken. PO Miller dusted the outside of the vehicle for latent prints but none were seen/obtained. Officers canvassed the area several times an attempt to locate the suspect but were unsuccessful.

### **Felonious Assault (2903.11)**

Officers were called to Bobolink Avenue for a report of a person shot. While enroute, officers were updated that the victim may be shot in the face, or impacted from the glass and was bleeding from the face. Officers Six and Wilber were first on scene. They secured the scene and checked



on the victim's condition. Shortly after securing the scene, Officer Six called for an ambulance to move in and treat the victim. The victim provided a description of two subjects he witnessed. He stated both appeared to be juveniles with one wearing a grey hoodie and one wearing a red hoodie. The victims did not see which suspect shot at their car. This information was immediately given over the radio by Officer Six. Officer

Wilber started gathering information from the four victims in the car. Officer Six then started speaking with the neighbors in an attempt to get any additional information. One neighbor stated after he heard the shots he went to the window. He then observed a "light colored sedan with very dark tint" leaving very quickly from the area of the shooting. This was also put out on the radio for incoming units. An area wide was requested by Officer Six, along with a K-9 unit to track the suspects who fled on foot.

One victim stated the family had just returned home from a church function. Upon approach, they attempted to turn into the driveway. The driveway however, was partially blocked by a light silver colored vehicle in the driveway. Her father

pulled forward of the driveway to allow the vehicle to leave. Soon after arriving, they saw three additional subjects near the north dead end of Bobolink. The subjects in the vehicle and the other group were apparently arguing and shortly thereafter, the subjects on foot start shooting at the other vehicle. The victim's vehicle however was in the way and was struck several times. The victims said that when the shooting started they all ducked down inside their vehicle to avoid being struck.

Two rounds struck the driver's side windshield, where the driver was sitting. An additional round (at least one) hit the passenger side window where another victim is sitting. The round passed over his right shoulder, through the seat and into the rear seat. The round barely missed another subject, who was sitting behind the driver. If she had not been cowering down the round looked as though it would have struck her in the center of her chest. The remaining round hit the passenger side, rear door. It traveled through the door and beneath where a female was sitting. When officers arrived, a



female stepped out of the driver's side. She stated this is because her sister had stepped out to call police and she then slid over to exit.

The scene was photographed and Green Twp K-9 arrived on scene soon thereafter. K-9 did deploy and tracked north over the divide of Bobolink into SPTP. The K-9 continued to track west and the track was called on Desoto Drive. SPTP Officer on scene stated they had a recent run to the same house for a prowler run. The description of the suspect involved there matched the description of the shooting suspects.

A search of the area was conducted upon return of the K-9. LT. Maus and Officer Wilber located several (5) shell casings north of the victims vehicle. These were .32 Auto shells and were collected as evidence. No additional casings were located. Once treated by squad the victims were released and went inside to clean up. The suspects are not known to the victim and this incident is still under investigation.
