ARRESTS MADE IN APRIL 2017

There were a total of 62 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in APRIL 2017.

36 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

26 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of APRIL 2017, 14 were residents of North College Hill and 48 were non-residents.

VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN APRIL 2017


There were a total of 33 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in APRIL 2017.

4 - of these crashes involved injuries.

17 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

8 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

4 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

IN APRIL 2017

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$44,940.16 as of APRIL 2017.



There were a total of **69** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in APRIL 2017.

27 of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

7 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

14 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

21 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN APRIL 2017

There were a total of 12 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in APRIL 2017. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN APRIL 2017

There were a total of 24 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in APRIL 2017.

9 of these false alarms were to businesses.



15 of these false alarms were to residences.

95 Total false alarms have been received in 2017.




The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

Vehicle Theft (2913.02)

The victim came to our station to report his vehicle was taken sometime around 0400 today's date from an unknown location on Betts Ave. The victim states he had driven a friend home from a bar, and was intoxicated himself. The victim decided to go inside the friend's residence to sober up before driving home. The victim states he went outside and moved his vehicle to a different parking location. When he came back out at approximately



0400, he was unable to locate his vehicle. The victim states he then walked to his residence in Greenhills, Ohio, and called police upon arriving home. The victim provided a license plate number for the vehicle, however that tag is still registered to the victim's former vehicle, a Chevrolet. The victim is unable to provide a VIN for the vehicle in question, and states he is making payments to Expressway Motors. The victim states he is not behind on payments.

The victim was advised the vehicle cannot be entered as stolen without the VIN. He was further advised a report would be on file with our department to document the incident, and to contact the car lot where he purchased the vehicle to obtain necessary information for the entry, and then to contact our department when he obtains that information.

Later, PO Henn was contacted by the owner of Expressway Motors. He advised the vehicle does have a GPS locator installed, and that vehicle is showing at Brushwood Ave and Daly Rd in CPD5. PO Henn responded to that location and did locate the vehicle. The vehicle was locked, and he was able to gain access via unlock kit. The victim's ID, a \$5.00 bill, and other personal items were located in the center console, however there were no keys. The vehicle did have a citation from CPD on the windshield advising the vehicle was found running and unoccupied, and the keys were taken by the officer and could be picked up at District 5.

The victim was contacted and he did respond to that location. He was then advised to respond to District 5 and the vehicle would be released to him.

Criminal Damaging **(2909.06)**

Officers were dispatched for a possible vehicle theft in progress. We were advised that a male subject was attempting to take the complainant's vehicle in the driveway. Upon arrival officers observed a female standing in the doorway of an apartment building. A male black was holding another male black at axe point in the driveway between two cars.

The subject that was armed with an axe was ordered to the ground at gun point, and was later identified as the victim. The other male was also detained and identified as the suspect/defendant.

The victim stated that he observed the defendant pull his car into the driveway and pull around to the back of the building. Once at the back of the building the defendant exited his vehicle armed with a jug of liquid. The defendant then walked over to victim's vehicle with the jug and was witnessed tampering with his vehicle near the gas door. At the time, the victim was unsure if he was pouring the liquid in the gas tank or on the



vehicle itself. After observing the defendant tampering with his vehicle he went outside to confront the subject while armed with an axe, while his girlfriend called the police.

The defendant stated that he came to visit his girlfriend and did provide a name, April, who does reside in the building however we were unable to make contact with her to verify his story.

The jug of liquid the defendant was carrying turned out to be a gallon of water which was half empty. Upon inspecting the victim's vehicle for damage, it was found that the gas tank door was ajar and the vehicle and ground directly below the gas tank door was wet. PO Miller opened the gas tank door and found the cap had been removed and the compartment filled with water.

The defendant attempted to pour approximately a half gallon of water into the victim's gas tank before he was confronted.

It is believed that the defendant came to damage his girlfriend's vehicle which is similar to the victim's vehicle. The defendant was arrested and charged with criminal damaging and transported to CJC.

Drug Abuse (2925.11)

While at the UDF, 6813 Hamilton Ave, for a crash report, PO Henn was alerted by a passer-by of a male subject in a white vehicle possibly using an unknown drug. He approached the vehicle and observed the defendant in the driver seat. He indicated for the subject to roll the window down, at which time the subject began to back up a short distance. PO Henn advised the driver to stop the vehicle, place the vehicle in park, and place the keys on the dash. The subject eventually complied, at which time PO Henn opened the driver door, and observed a book of some kind on the driver's lap with a greenish white powder on top. He asked the driver what he had been doing, and he stated he was crushing a Tylenol for ingestion. PO Henn removed the subject from the vehicle and patted him down for officer safety. He secured the book with the powder, and then secured the subject in his cruiser. PO Henn advised the subject of his Miranda Warning, and asked again what kind of pills was he crushing on the book. He advised he was crushing a Tylenol tablet and a Clonazepam for ingestion. The subject stated he does have a

prescription for the Clonazepam, and a bottle with the subject's name was located in the front seat, containing tablets that do identify as that medication. The subject states he has a "nasal fixation" and is a recovering opiate addict, and as such, he prefers to ingest his prescription medication and Tylenol nasally. The subject also volunteered that he was in possession of one Vicodin, which he states was given to him by his mother for pain. He acknowledged he does not have a prescription for the Vicodin. After a search of the vehicle, a clear and red plastic pill crusher was located in the front seat, and in the storage portion of the

device, a single Vicodin tablet was located wrapped in a piece of cellophane. The Vicodin, the unknown powder, a PNC Bank Debit Card which was being used to crush

the powder, and the pill crusher were packaged and the subject was transported to our station for processing. The subject was advised the powder will be sent to the lab for analysis, and should the powder return as anything other than the medication he claimed, he would be charged with drug possession.



The victim came home this morning and discovered that subject(s) unknown did break the window in the door leading to the basement where he resides with his sister. Once inside, he noticed his Playstation 4, games, and laptop computer had been taken. He did not give anyone permission to take these items.

The victim stated he left his residence at approximately 1000 hours yesterday and returned home at 1115 hours today. That was when he noticed the broken window. He

stated the door was locked when he returned home. It is believed the subject(s) broke the window, unlocked the door, entered the basement, took the

property and left through the door, locking it when they left.

The victim's sister stated she left the house at 1300 hours yesterday and returned home at 2330 hours. She had returned home at 1830 hours yesterday, then went to Northern Kentucky, returning back home at approximately 0030 hours on today's date. Neither of them heard

anyone break the window, or rummage through the basement while they were home.

PO Brown also responded to the scene and was able to find 3 fingerprints and a palm print on the glass that was left in the door. These prints were lifted and will be submitted for identification.

Telecommunications Harassment (2917.21)


PO Henn was called to Mar Bev Dr. for a telecommunications harassment report. Upon arrival, he was met by the victim who states his son, the suspect, has been making threatening text messages to the victim's phone. The suspect is angry that the victim has ceased providing financial aid, or allowing him to stay at their residence. At 1705 today's date, the suspect texted that he was going to come to the victim's residence and harm the residents as well as the house. The victim states the suspect is currently homeless, and would need to obtain a ride from someone in order to come to the residence. The victim states he believes the suspect is using

unknown narcotics, which is affecting the suspect's behavior.

The victim was advised a report would be on file with our department to document the incident as well as the procedure to follow for obtaining a copy of that report. He was further advised of the procedure to follow for obtaining a civil protection order against this son. While PO Henn was at the victim's residence, the victim sent the suspect a text message telling the suspect to cease contact with him or the rest of his family. The suspect then replied with several threatening text messages. The victim was advised to contact police should the suspect come to his residence.

Felonious Assault (2911.01)

Officers were dispatched to Frisch's Restaurant, for a report of a female injured from an assault. Upon arrival, we learned that the female had been "pistol whipped" while standing at the counter to pay her bill. The female had been bleeding from her left ear and had a broken front upper tooth. She appeared dazed from the assault, saying she was hit from



behind and her tooth was knocked out.

According to a couple of witnesses there, the victim was standing in line, two male blacks, one with light skin and the other with dark skin, accompanied by a younger female black, were standing behind her in line. The witnesses stated that the group appeared to be arguing with the employees about their meal and paying their bill. The light skinned male and the female walked past the victim, still arguing with the staff. The witnesses say that the victim had words for the light skinned male and the female. It was at that point the dark skinned male, who was still behind the victim, pulled what appeared to be a black handgun from his waist and hit the victim on the left side of the head, causing the victim to plunge into the wall to the left of the cashier counter. After hitting the wall, the victim fell to the floor, possibly causing her tooth to be broken off.

There were two witnesses there who observed most of what had occurred and both were requested to write statements. While talking to the witnesses, we observed another female walk in the area where the offense occurred, holding an ice



pack on the left side of her face near her left eye. She advised that she was struck by someone or something during the incident, however she could not say how it happened, but that it was a result of the assault of the other female.

One of the witnesses provided a license plate number of the vehicle driven by the female who was with the two males. All three individuals got into a greenish colored Chevy Malibu with heavy front end damage. The plate was queried through RCIC and came back to a Black Acura 4 door vehicle. This may be that the wrong plate number was obtained by the witness or the plate had been switched to a different vehicle. There were also three different male blacks attached to that vehicle. The two witnesses identified and strongly believed one of the males was the light skinned male that was in the group, but not the one that assaulted the victim. This incident is still under investigation.

Theft (2913.02)

Officers were called to Dollar General for a possible theft in progress. The subjects were last seen walking towards the Super Laundry. Det. Ferguson was in the area


when the call came out and he and PO Lasonczyk located the suspects at the Super Laundry. The suspects stated they were in Dollar General and the female suspect had items in a basket that she placed by the register when she exited the store. The male suspect did have a tote that had several food items in it, which both subjects stated while they were separated that they purchased those items at Kroger in Mt. Airy.

The Assistant Manager, as well as her boss were unable to determine what, if anything was taken. They do believe they had concealed other items, but they were unable to determine what.

The male suspect was found to have an open warrant through Butler County. He was advised and served with a Trespass Notification and then was released to the Butler County Sheriff's Office. The female suspect was released after being advised and served with a Trespass Notification.

Vandalism (2909.05)

On 4/26/17 at 2:17 am, officers were dispatched to the intersection of W. Galbraith Rd and Simpson Ave to investigate a group of juveniles throwing rocks at business in the area. A dispatched update



advised that the suspects were 4 male blacks wearing jeans and hoodies, and they were currently fleeing from the scene on foot down an unknown side street off of W. Galbraith Rd.

The immediate area was searched, and the subjects could not be located. Officer J. Cole checked the businesses near the intersection of W. Galbraith and Simpson and observed cracked glass on the entrance door of Ameristop, 2001 W. Galbraith Rd. Several medium size rocks were also observed in the parking lot near the entrance door. The alarm to the business was also activated, possibly set off by the rocks striking the door. All of the doors were secure.

Robbery (2911.02)

On the above date, a complainant and her son came to the PD to make a report about an assault that occurred earlier in the day. The victim stated that on his way home from school, one unknown juvenile male, and one known juvenile male had assaulted him by striking him multiple times in the face near Long John Silvers on W Galbraith Rd. He also stated that during the assault, the known suspect demanded the victim give his phone

to him. He then stated that as the suspect and the other unknown male were punching him, the known suspect took his phone by force and both boys left the scene. The phone was a white HTC cell phone.



Both the victim and his mother advised they would like to press charges. PO Shepherd advised them she would take a report and attempt to identify the other unknown male from the assault.

Upon observation of the victim, PO Shepherd saw that he had a small cut on his face, a knot on his left temple, and a swollen lip, all he stated was from the assault. The victim denied medical attention. Photos were taken of his injuries.
