### **ARRESTS MADE IN JUNE 2015**

There were a total of <u>92</u> arrests made within the City of North College Hill in JUNE 2015.

<u>53</u> of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

<u>39</u> of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of JUNE 2015, **59** were residents of North College Hill and **33** were non-residents.



# VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN JUNE 2015

There were a total of <u>40</u> auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in JUNE 2015.

- <u>1</u> of these crashes involved injuries.
- 15 of the auto accidents were on public roadways.
- <u>7</u> of the auto accidents were on private property.
- 18 of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



## TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED IN JUNE 2015

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$80,195.00 as of JUNE 2015.



There were a total of **67** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in JUNE 2015.

17 of the citations

were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

**15** of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

12 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

23 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



## VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN JUNE 2015

There were a total of <u>5</u> vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in JUNE 2015. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)




## FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED IN JUNE 2015

There were a total of <u>24</u> false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in JUNE 2015.

**8** of these false alarms were to businesses.

16 of these false alarms were to residences.

The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

### **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

#### Theft (2913.02)

Officers were dispatched for a theft that just occurred 5 minutes prior, involving a male black, wearing a white t-shirt and long blue jean shorts, who was last seen heading east on W. Galbraith Rd. The subject had stolen at least 3 bottles of laundry detergent.

Upon arrival PO Miller was greeted by the store shift leader, who stated an unknown male black had entered the store and concealed laundry detergent in two white plastic bags and then

exited the store passing all points of sale with paying for said property.

The shift leader was able to access the store surveillance footage and the video showed a male black enter the store with nothing in his hands and then exit the store carrying two plastic bags containing a green bottle, believed to be Gain and at least two red bottles, believed to be

Tide. The video did not have a good view of the subjects face for identification.

The subject exited the store and walked in the rear yards of the houses along W. Galbraith Rd. Officers canvassed the area and even checked the

Northcreek laundry room but was

unable to locate any possible suspects.

#### **Assault (2903.13)**

The complainant stated that she has been dating an individual she only knows by "Roberto," for 3 weeks and attempted to end the relationship. He came to her residence, grabbed her, threw her against the kitchen counter, grabbed her head and told her that the relationship is not going to end. He has subsequently texted her and stated that he was going to blow up her car and come to her house and hurt her. She is going to attempt to figure out his name and then proceed with criminal charges.

#### **Burglary (2911.12)**

Officers were dispatched for a burglary report. Upon arrival, PO Miller was greeted by the complainant on the front porch. He stated that an unknown person(s) had entered his house and removed the listed property.

The complainant left his house at around 1745 hrs. on 06/08/15 to attend the Reds game. He returned home at around 2300 hrs. Upon

entering his residence he noticed that the pole he uses to brace the interior basement door close was lying on the kitchen floor. The side door was found ajar and a crow bar was lying in a chair in the dining room. He explained that his father comes over frequently to perform foundation work in the basement and just believed that his father had come over and forgot to close the door.

When the complainant entered his bedroom he found that his dresser drawers were open and some of his belongings personal had been glass moved. containing mug change missing and was loose



change was lying on the floor. The mug was later found in the under bedroom the bed next to a basket. clothes however the change was missing, approximately \$5 worth. A watch

and some personal items had been moved and were placed on his bed.

The complainant contacted his father who confirmed that he was at the house but believes he locked the door when he left. The crow bar found in the dining room belongs to the

complainant's father and was original in the basement and had been moved by the suspects. A pair of rubber gloves was found in the kitchen and they were also originally in the basement and are believed to have been used by the suspect(s)

After checking the house, a basement window was found to be missing. The complainant stated that window was covered by a board. The board was found in the rear yard and was only covering the window and not secured anyway. A muddy shoe print

was observed on the interior basement door leading from the basement to the upstairs. This door had the pole braced against it from the kitchen side.

It is believed that the perpetrator entered through the rear basement window. Once inside they wore a pair of rubber gloves found in the basement and grabbed a crow bar to assist them with the interior basement door that was braced. Once upstairs they went through the bedroom dressers, stole approximately \$5 in change, before leaving through the side door.

## Felonious Assault (2903.11)

Officers were called to the address for a report of domestic trouble, and to meet with the female caller in the front yard of the residence. Upon arrival officers were talking with the female and she advised they were involved in a verbal dispute that escalated to the male putting a cord around her neck and trying to choke her. The female also advised the male was pushing her around and

pushed her down. Officers were not able to observe any marks on

the female.

POLICE DO NOT CROSS

The male came out of the residence while the officers were talking to the female. He advised

that he and the female were involved in а verbal confrontation escalated to the female taking his from his night stand and knife threating him with it. He also advised the female had thrown the knife in a sideways swinging throw that struck him in the upper abdominal area of the front of his torso. There was a puncture wound to the area of his abdomen and a hole matching the wound in his shirt. There was also a red substance on his shirt that appeared to match the wound that looked like blood soaked into the shirt.

The knife was found outside of the residence on the ground next to the stairs for the front porch. The male advised that was the knife the female used to throw at him and cause the injury. The knife was secured for evidence. The male refused to have the life squad called and advised he did not want to be late for work due to having to go to the hospital.

The female was transported to the station, taken to the Hamilton County Justice Center, and charged with felonious Assault.

## Criminal Mischief (2909.07)

A caller stated they heard something hit their front window. When looking outside they observed

who 3 males appeared to be very young running away from the house. A heavy set female was also running away. The caller making tried contact with the



kids with no success. They believe the heavy set girl lives in the home across the street. After checking the home the foster mother stated nobody like that lives there. It was also unknown where the other juvenile males live on that street. The caller also stated that same group had been lighting fireworks off for over an hour. Along with the egg all over the window, PO Jones also observed a large amount of used fireworks in the street.

#### Robbery (2911.02)

Kroger's Loss Prevention Officers stated they had observed a person taking product from inside the store, and walk past all points of sale without paying for the items. They stated that they attempted to stop the suspect as he was exiting the east entrance/exit doors of Kroger's. They stated as they were stopping the

suspect, he became combative and resisted the attempts made by Loss Prevention to control him. The Loss Prevention Officers stated they had to wrestle him to the ground a few times before gaining any type of control. Once the suspect was on the ground he started complaining that he was having a heart attack and his chest was hurting.

As officers arrived, the suspect was on the floor on his stomach. He was saying his chest was hurting. He was advised an ambulance was on the way. Once the ambulance arrived they determined he needed to be transported to University Hospital.

Officer Brown responded to University Hospital to place a Police Hold on the suspect. Once Officer Brown arrived, he attempted to locate the suspect in the Emergency Room. When he arrived in the patient room, the suspect was gone. Officer Brown notified Dispatch to place an All

County Broadcast on the suspect.

#### Theft (2913.02)

The victim came to our station to report an unknown person or persons entered her unlocked vehicle and removed (2) two portable GPS units without vehicle from the her knowledge or consent. The victim's vehicle was parked in the lot of her apartment complex. The victim states the GPS units have a tracking device installed, and she will be in contact with her employer to have the units tracked. She will contact our department should the location for the units be obtained.

## Criminal Damaging (2909.06)

PO Henn was called to the St. Paul's UCC for a property damage report. Upon arrival, he was met by the reporting person who states an unknown person or persons damaged a window on the west side of the building by unknown means. The window appears to have been broken by an unknown object. The reporter

stated there have been several similar incidents that have occurred

recently.

The reporter was advised a report would be on

file to document the incident as well as the procedure to follow for obtaining a copy of that report. PO Henn was able to speak with Ann Brinkley of the NCH High School regarding the camera mounted on the north side of the school to see if the surveillance captured the suspects.

#### Theft of Vehicle (2913.02)

Officers were dispatched for a report of a stolen vehicle. PO Elston arrived on scene and spoke with the vehicle owner. She told him that she left her car running outside and went back inside for a moment. When she arrived back outside, her vehicle was gone. She stated that no children

were in the vehicle at the time of the theft. Her neighbor across the street said the minutes prior to this incident he saw two young black males around the area near the victims driveway. He said that he did not recognize them from the area.

Officers searched the area and checked the parking lots and streets near Ronald Reagan and Hamilton Ave as well. PO Elston advised the victim that it would be a good idea to cancel her credit cards ASAP to prevent them from being used. She told me that her purse, cell phone and child's car seat were in the vehicle as well. PO Elston told her that we would enter the vehicle as stolen and would be in contact with her should we find it.

#### Theft (2913.02)

Officers were dispatched to Kroger's for a theft of an auto that just occurred 5 minutes ago. When PO Wilber arrived, the complainant flagged him; down saying his truck got stolen. The complainant stated that he and his partner were doing landscaping as they were walking

around Kroger's. The complainant stated that when they got back to where the truck should have been that it was gone. He then called 911 and his partner went inside Kroger's to see if he could watch

any video they might have of it.

The complainant stated to PO Wilber that the truck was a company truck from the landscaping company he works for and that the truck is a Ford, gray in color with a trailer on it hauling a riding lawnmower and a walk behind mower. He did not know the license plate number of the truck. PO Wilber then asked him if he could call his boss to find out the plate numbers. At this time an unknown M/W who knew the complainant pulled up and told him "Hey man, I just saw your truck going east on Ronald Reagan Highway". PO Wilber updated dispatch then the on direction of travel.

As PO Wilber was walking into Kroger's to go look at the video, the complainant told him the license plate number to the truck. At that time, PO Wilber asked dispatch to put out a short broadcast for the stolen vehicle. He did get ahold of the owner of the

truck, who also owns the landscape company Professional Grounds Care.

The truck was later recovered on Harrison Avenue in an apartment complex. The truck and trailer were still together but the mowers were loaded off and missing.
